4. Distinctive Features of the Programme and the Student Experience

Learn by making films taught by filmmakers!

The BA Filmmaking programme employs a creative-driven, participatory ethos underpinned with industry standards and an independent spirit. The programme is designed to emphasise the value of learning through practical investigation and filmmaking, informed by critical understanding.

Over the course of the degree, you will develop skills and key specialisms, including directing, editing, cinematography, writing, art design, sound and producing, making work *collaboratively* and *independently* in a creatively challenging but supportive teaching and learning environment.

You will explore and identify themes, stories and structures through ongoing filmmaking practice, with an emphasis on experimentation, imagination and innovation. You will be pushed to take risks, to explore new crafts, cinematic skills and experiences. You will be taught by filmmakers, artists and industry-based professionals, with special guest talks and masterclasses to support specialist practice. You will have the opportunity to engage in common challenges across the school alongside responding to live briefs inside and outside the institution, exploring contemporary issues and developing professional skills and industry practices.

The programme makes use of high-end production equipment, with Netflix-approved cameras, dedicated studio spaces, editing and production and postproduction labs

and a fully-functioning professional cinema. Our filmmaking baseroom is in the Scott building which features our own moving image library supplied to us by the Bill Douglas museum, but also acts as a space for you to socialize, edit and engage in filmmaking project work. The Scott building also houses several digital suites for editing, two greenscreen film studios and a bespoke daylight studio, analogue darkrooms, sound booths, dedicated editing spaces, print facilities and a major Letterpress, Printmaking and Silkscreen facility. Nearby to the Scott building is the Universities café and Jill Craigie Cinema, which Filmmaking utilises as a teaching, work in progress and final screening space.

Your creative filmmaking practice will be *supported* and *informed* through ongoing engagement with theoretical and historical contexts, critically underpinning your work and allowing you to expand your ideas through the histories and practices of the *exciting* world of cinema!

The programme is very much an outward looking course. This includes: field trips, festival engagement, public exhibitions, and industry visits all part of the experience. Our students constantly look towards embracing public audiences and work on live-briefs and projects with professional organisations, communities and individuals beyond the university; producing rich and exciting opportunities to engage with creative filmmaking with real purpose in the world, be that creative, cultural, promotional, academic or educational.

Our staff are filmmakers and creative practitioners who offer expertise in idea generation, production, producing and research as well as contemporary postproduction techniques and emerging technologies and creative moving image and sound practices. Our recent visiting lecturers and guest talks has included Oscar winning cinematographer Roger Deakins, Director of Photography John Sorapure and Bafta winning director Esther May Campbell. We continually draw from emerging professional filmmakers and eminent figures across our industries, offering students invaluable insights into a range of filmmaking practices.

There are possibilities for Filmmaking graduates to progress to Masters Level PGT and PGR programmes within the University leading to possibilities for MPhil or PhD research degrees.

7. Programme aims

BA Filmmaking aims to provide:

- 1 The opportunity to work with hands-on filmmaking practices, emphasising the value of learning through creative practical investigation informed by critical understanding.
- 2 A multi-disciplinary environment of teaching and learning that is designed to foster reflective, creative practice, collaboration and a flexible approach to the development of methods and processes in filmmaking cultural production.

Progression accords with a number of partner colleges which means that graduates of FdA programmes at these colleges can join at level 6.

Disability Assist (DAS) offer advice and guidance to current and prospective Plymouth University students and staff. This includes arranging the appropriate provision for students with disabilities. Students who declare they have a disability are invited with to meet with a staff member from Disability Assist and the Programme Manager to discuss their learning needs and support at the start of their studies.

10. Progression criteria for Final and Intermediate Awards

There is direct progression with AP partner colleges onto the final year of degree.

Students achieving a total of 120 credits will be entitled to receive a Certificate on Higher Education. Students achieving a total of 240 credits (of which at least 120 are at level 5 or above) will be entitled to a Diploma of Higher Education. 320 credits (of which 80 are at level 6 and a further 120 at Level 5 or above) qualify a student for an

Ordinary Degree. 360 credits will entitle the student to be awarded the BA (Hons) Filmmaking Degree.

11. Exceptions to Regulations

PARM Board assessments

A Provisional Assessment Referral Meeting (PARM) is held that allows for in-year referrals of Semester 1 studio modules (practice-based modules) to be undertaken within 'term' time, when students are still based in Plymouth and there is full technical support still available.

If a student fails a module in Stage 1 or 2 prior to the end of the first semester, they may be given an opportunity to undertake referred assignments and to be reassessed for that module prior to the meeting of the Subject Assessment Panels at the end of the academic year.
