4. Distinctive Features of the Programme and the Student Experience

- The programme is designed to act as a blend of incubation unit, academic study and enterprise. Exploring and developing applicants' current practice via various strategies including briefs which acknowledge prior learning, align with UN sustainability goals and promote entrepreneurial and professional ambitions.
- The programme aims to capitalise upon the first class resources, facilities and academic research within the University and the potential for links and collaboration across the various Faculties and with wider communities, locally, nationally and internationally. This will be strengthened by University initiatives such as the FoAH HEIF 18-19 Enterprise Hub with its remit to target businesses and organisations operating across the Creative and Cultural Industries, Heritage, Advanced Manufacturing, Health and Education Sectors.

- A scheduled series of professional practice lectures combined with in-module activities will instil professional practice acumen and behaviours.
- Emphasis is placed upon critical reflection, experimentation and collaboration within Illustration, combined with real world training.
- Theoretical, critical, historical and contextual elements of illustrative practice are delivered through a seminar series running throughout the first and second stages of the programme and encourages students to critically analyse and articulate their practice within historical and contemporary contexts.
- Staff research interests, outputs and professional practice at national and international levels inform and enrich the delivery of the curriculum.
- Regular visiting practitioners and speakers offer a diversity of viewpoints and opinion enabling students to enter further into current debates within Illustrative practice.
- The proposed admission is on a 2 year part-time route, but allowing students full time access to facilities.
- MILL701 may be taken as a CPD module (MILL701PD).
- Each student is established within the post-graduate culture at UoP and encouraged to self-identify as either an independent 'brand' or as a 'collective'.
- Students are allocated studio provision from which to explore, develop and continue their professional practice whilst studying for the MA Illustration
- They will create a professional, creative studio environment within the RIBA award-winning, Roland Levinsky Building based in the centre of the ocean city of Plymouth.
- This space enables exploration and development of their professional careers and access to resources (subject to availability), such as – life drawing | printmaking | letterpress | ceramics | 3D printing | virtual reality | animation | photography | book binding | digital suites | textiles | laser cutting | wood and metal fabrication workshops. Introductions and on-going support is provided by a highly skilled team of technicians delivering specific practical workshops.

- They will contribute to the creative culture of Plymouth via opportunities offered which link with local events and competitions.
- Students are offered comprehensive support with academic study skills.
- The library is open 24/7, 365 days per year and offers a vast range of resources in the form of both online and printed publications such as books and journals, a moving image database and various discovery tools, databases both written and image-based.
- The Library also houses the Special Collections: the Rare Books | Artists Books | Rare Journals | Exeter College of Art and Design archive | Zine collections
- Digital resources such as Linda.com are available to each student to enhance their digital software learning.
- The opportunity to take part in field study trips locally, nationally and abroad are aspects of this programme. These are tied in with Illustration specific external events and exhibitions such as the Bologna Children's Book Fair, Italy | Pictoplasma Character Design and Animation Festival, Berlin | House of Illustration – various exhibitions, London.
- Students are invited to take part in a London Graduate Showcase such as D&AD, New Blood

6. Programme Structure

The programme is made of four 30 M-Level credit modules and one 60 M-Level credit module for which there are two alternatives; MILL705A (practical) and MILL705B (dissertation), please see attachments for the Definitive Module Descriptors of all the programme modules (MILL701, MILL702, MILL703, MILL704, MILL705A, MILL705B).

Successfully completing the first two 30 m-level credit modules (MILL701, MILL702) achieves a post graduate certificate (**PGCert**) in Illustration.

Successfully completing the first four 30 m-level credit modules (MILL701, MILL702, MILL703, MILL704) achieves a post graduate diploma (**PGDip**) in Illustration.

Successfully completing 180 credits (as above plus either MILL705A or MILL705B) achieves a Masters degree (**MA**) in Illustration.

MILL701PD is a CPD module available to those who want to develop their skillset and also trial whether the whole MA would be appropriate for them. Successful completion would count towards A PGCert in Illustration

There are three stages within the programme;

1. PROCESS and PRACTICE

The first stage is concerned with developing core skills, analyzing and sharing prior visual language and methodologies and exploring technologies, both traditional and cutting-edge Illustration practice whilst laying foundations for future modules.

2. CONTENT & CONTEXT and PRODUCTION & DISSEMINATION

The second stage gives students the opportunities to define their research questions and potentially collaborate with other departments across the University.

Competitions, live briefs and collaboration with local, national and international agencies are also a feature.

Content, communication and the means, constraints and potentials of manufacture and distribution are studied and practically engaged with.

A range of professional practice lectures are delivered to help prepare students for their commercial practice.

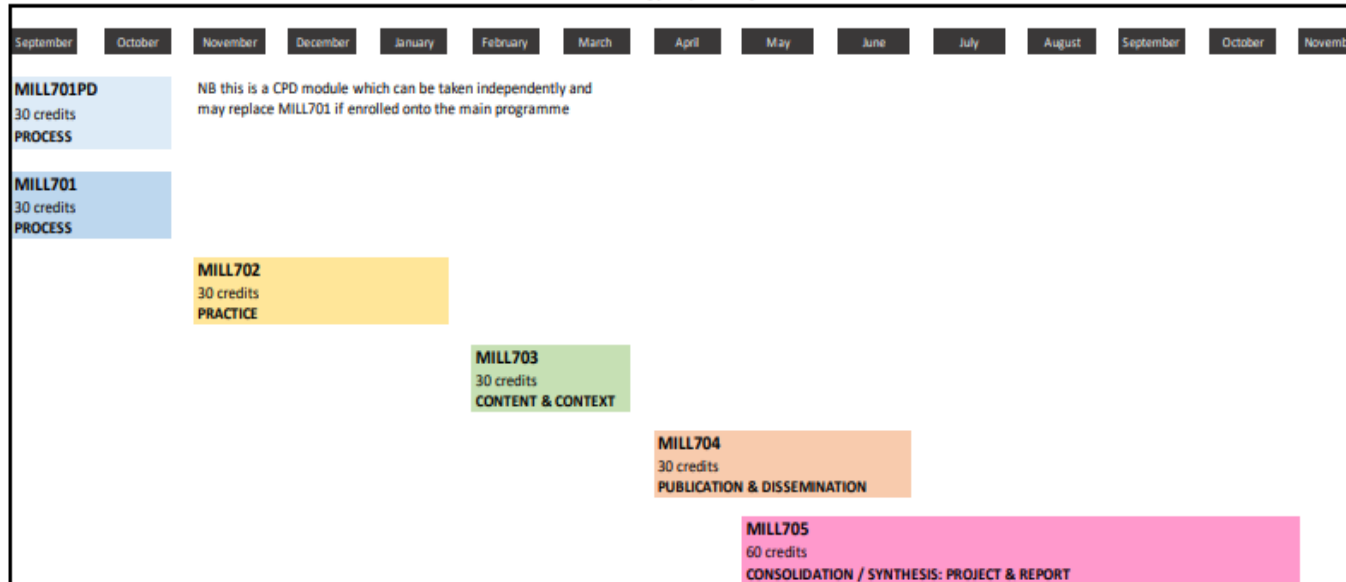
3. CONSOLIDATION / SYNTHESIS

The third and final stage sees students establish their research questions and negotiate their own proposals, which may include live briefs and competitions, to consolidate their learning and establish their personal practice within the breadth of Illustration contexts.

They can opt to take either a practical or written focus to this final stage.

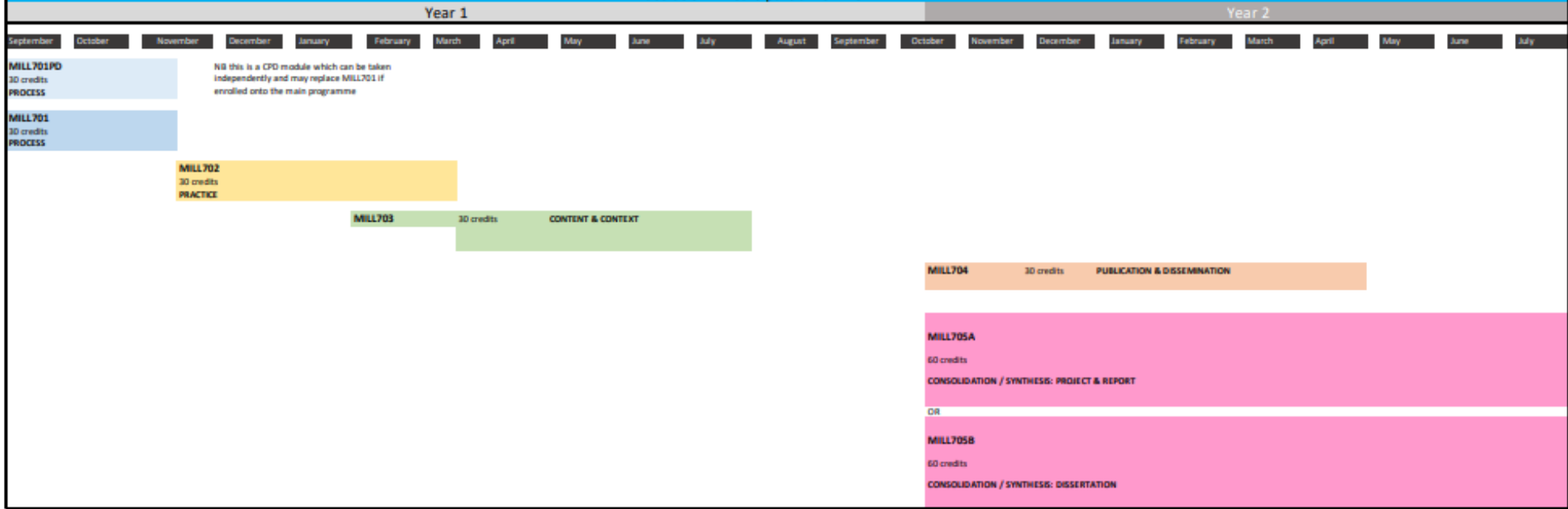
Research, critical and contextual skills are embedded throughout the programme via a seminar series and practical workshops.

7. Programme Aims

The programme is intended to enable and encourage students to:

1. experience a transformative educational experience that develops their understanding of and approach to contemporary illustration practice and establishes them as viable, entrepreneurial practitioners and/or candidates for further study at MPhil/PhD level.
2. investigate and develop a deep critical understanding of their focus of Illustration study and practice by demonstrating knowledge, competence and confidence of an area informed by or at the forefront of Illustration practice by research, project development and realisation and through the systematic evaluation and critical analysis of contemporary and historical Illustration, changing technologies and cultural contexts.
3. engage with issues concerning social, cultural and/or political areas of contemporary debate and investigation e.g. UN Sustainability Goals.
4. engage with a framework of sustained national and international academic debate to develop and demonstrate, a deep understanding of theories, practices and knowledge both relating to existing and/or new Illustration technologies, considering notions of 'audience' and the implications of existing and new modes of distribution.
5. effectively focus, position and develop their study and practice to achieve a body of work and methodology of practice appropriate to existing and emerging professional creative marketplaces; which can enable them to maximise their career opportunities, entrepreneurial skills and prospects as a professional autonomous or collective practitioner within their chosen field in the Illustration and wider Art and Design industries or, if appropriate, establish a direction for further academic research to MPhil/PhD level.

8. Programme Intended Learning Outcomes

Masters degrees are awarded to students who have demonstrated:

PLO1 a systematic understanding of knowledge, and a critical awareness of current problems and/or new insights, much of which is at, or informed by, the forefront of illustration practice and theory, both nationally and internationally.

PLO2 a comprehensive understanding of techniques applicable to their own research or advanced scholarship within the discipline of illustration.

PLO3 originality in the application of knowledge, together with a practical understanding of how established techniques of research and enquiry are used to create and interpret knowledge in illustration and associated creative fields.

Conceptual understanding that enables the student:

PLO4 to evaluate critically current research and advanced scholarship in illustration and to evaluate methodologies and develop critiques of them and, where appropriate, to propose new hypotheses.

Typically, holders of the qualification will be able to:

9. Admissions Criteria, including APL, APEL and DAS arrangements

Entry Requirements for MA Illustration	
BA Illustration or associated BA courses	Normal minimum entry requirements are 2:1 plus supporting portfolio of work and a 200 - 500 word draft statement of intent. Candidates are interviewed before an offer is made. We will consider students below 2:1 if they can demonstrate a strong academic portfolio or a record of professional experience.
International	Normal minimum entry requirements are 2:1 (or equivalent) plus supporting portfolio of work and a 200 - 500 word draft statement of intent. Candidates are interviewed before an offer is made. We will consider students below 2:1 if they can demonstrate a strong academic portfolio or a record of professional experience. IELTS score of 6.5 or equivalent required for overseas students.
APL, APEL and transferring students	The University also has substantial experience in supporting mature students and welcomes applicants in this category. Applicants with APL https://www.plymouth.ac.uk/uploads/production/document/path/9/9353/APL_case_studies.pdf will be considered on an individual basis according to the University Regulations Framework. Students interested in transferring postgraduate credits will be considered on merit and current University regulations regarding transfer of credits from other institutions will apply. A supporting portfolio of work and a 200 - 500 word draft statement of intent. Candidates are interviewed before an offer is made.

200 - 500 word draft statement

- This should outline the applicant's areas of potential interest, avenues of potential study and career aspirations.

Portfolios

- Applicants will be required to supply a digital portfolio of their work that demonstrates a range of their most recent work together with accompanying descriptive notes, including a specimen of their most recent essays, seminar papers and/or dissertation.

Interviews

- Where feasible, applicants will be asked to attend an interview together with their portfolio of work.
As an alternative to a physical interview, the interview may also be undertaken online using Skype or similar with accompanying digital portfolio.
- The portfolio of work may be print and/or digitally based and if it is impractical to bring examples of 3 dimensional or installation / environmental / performance work; videos or good quality photographs are acceptable.
- The portfolio, in combination with the applicant's previous learning / experience and the outline proposal, should demonstrate their suitability and potential to:
 - research, identify, evaluate and solve Illustration problems
 - research, identify, evaluate and contextualise Illustration theoretical frameworks at Masters level.

10. Progression criteria for Final and Intermediate Awards

Students achieving 60 credits at pass level (MILL701 / MILL701PD & MILL702) are eligible for the Intermediate Award: **PGCert Illustration**

Students achieving 120 credits at pass level (as per PGCert Illustration plus MILL703 & MILL704) are eligible for the Intermediate Award: **PGDip Illustration**

Students achieving 180 credits at pass level (as per PGDip Illustration plus either MILL705A or MILL705B) are eligible for the Final Award: **MA Illustration**

Students achieving an aggregate of 49.5 - 59% are awarded: **MA Illustration**

Students achieving an aggregate of 60 - 69% are awarded: **MA Illustration Merit**

Students achieving an aggregate of 70% and above are awarded: **MA Illustration Distinction**
